Choosing Trees for Impact

Beautiful? Yes, however, in urban settings these old forest giants are often not the best choice. Dick Bir, author of *Growing and Propagating Showy Native Woody Plants*, will discuss choosing trees for maximum impact based on flowers, form and foliage. Dick is the most recent winner of the prestigious Arthur Hoyt Scott Medal whose previous honorees include Dr. JC Raulston and Dr. Michael Dirr.

The Ultimate Tree Stress!

Soil compaction is a hidden killer of urban trees. The added stress from soil compaction leads to decline and death of trees. This stress is usually blamed on some other factor. Dr. Coder is recognized internationally as a champion for improving the survivability of today's urban trees. He was a founding member of the Georgia Urban Forest Council, world president of the ISA, and has taught in UGA's Warnell School of Forestry and Natural Resources since 1985.
